

## Our Themes

After going through all our websites, I found a multitude of themes, and organized them into the broader categories below. Overall we seem to broadly value learning about opportunities for gaining experience, communication of knowledge, and the quest for personal inspiration. I found it interesting that many of us had an interest in objects which could be used purely for utility, but were interested more in the story behind them or what significance they brought to our life/others lives besides the basic function they hold (ex: soaps, clothes, circuits, jewelry).

Finding ways to frame these themes together is way more difficult than I thought, but I have a few ideas we could attempt based on the themes I came up with. A "basic" idea would be to collect what odd topics each of us got invested in during the pandemic, as this seemed to be a through-line in many of our interviews (the people interviewed really found their space during the pandemic). Another idea could be to reflect on an object that has particular meaning to us, but boring utility value otherwise and build that into sort of a I-Spy house set-up where the user can find hidden meanings in what seems like a room of normal objects? Idk. A final idea could be to explore how we change our expression in physical vs digital spaces with relation either to a particular item, emotion, study, or opportunity. For instance, this is a very lame example, but going off a theme of clothes and self expression we could explore how we like to dress in person vs how we like to dress our online avatars and implement these ideas into a final website.

Most of the interviews highlighted some kind of creative practice. There were outright artistic subjects, such as Marie's interview with a professional painter, but there were also instances of creativity in other fields, such as Iroha's interview with an architect and Anya's interview with an Electrical and Computer Engineering major here at Princeton, the latter of which discussed balancing STEM and a humanities in one's education. Throughout all the interviews, one of the most common questions asked was something along the lines of, "What is your biggest inspiration?" Thus, a common thread for these interviews was getting inside the interviewee's minds to understand how they perceive the world, and to better understand how this perception of theirs influences the work that they do, both in their professional and their daily lives.

I think some interviews grappled with the perceived divide between science ("STEM") and humanities, when in reality they are much more connected than one thinks. I can see this question being raised in Anya's, Alice's, and my interview. A common throughline is the perception that STEM is "superior" and more "legitimate" as a form of knowledge creation than the arts. However, almost all of the interviewees reject this black-and-white notion, not only because it is wrong but because it could have adverse consequences. Another common theme among certain interviews is "individuality" or "selfexpression." For Emmie's interview with Rosangela, the desire to stay connected to one's roots and promoting that common community is evident. Pretty much all "artists" or "creators" interviewed talked about their inspo and work as a means of self-expression. In Oyinkansola's interview with Kate and Sierra, they define fashion as "the study of art" and "self-expression" through clothing!

In a strange way, "service" finds its way as a common emergent theme for all interviews? In all interviews, the interviewees are directly serving others (Davidson with KenSAP), or through their practice serve themselves to create something for others (art/design/fragrances). I almost feel like I am cheating since it is also the theme for Are.na Review 2022, but in this sense I think "service" is the best possible common denominator.

One of the themes that I found interesting in the interviews was between whether the interviewee was still a student or whether they were someone who was already working. If the interviewee was not a student, the interviews often included questions regarding why they decided to work in that particular field. In addition, it was interesting to see how some interviewees started their jobs as hobbies, while for others it was more of a coincidence that they started to work in a particular field. In addition, if the interviewee was doing work that was related to their hobby and/or work that started as a hobby, there was a common question regarding work-life balance and how they separate work from their hobby. Moreover, some of the interviews were focused more on asking about technical details about a topic, while others were more focused on the interviewee's relationship with the topic.

There was also the theme of how design connects to academic fields. Similarly, it was interesting that many of the interviewees combined different interests that they had together or would find connections between the various interests that they have. The topic of inspiration and where the interviewee finds inspiration for their work was also frequently discussed in many of the interviews.

It was also interesting to see how the interviewees often talked about their background and how their background led them to pursue a particular field. For some, it was because they started it at a young age or from when they were an adult, while for others, it started from a cultural connection. Seeing this, it was interesting to see how people started pursuing their interests from such different times in life.







## A Precedent




"Capsule" by Megan Pai & Cammie Lee, '22

Capsule weaved together multiple individual conversations into one stream, as if everyone were present for a "roundtable"


