

Personal Maps of the Internet

Setting & Instructions

For the last ~3 weeks of class, we will be turning the class into a *lab*. That is, we'll be using class time to **work** both alone & together on something.

Using Tiana Dueck's lecture & workshop as a starting point (www.tiana.land/map/1), create your own map of the internet. You can begin by doing this in pencil & paper. Then consider how you'd like to integrate this map into your life and everyday browsing habits. What's the best format and ritual use for this map? Sketch some possibilities.

As a class, we'll talk about presenting our internet maps together in some way. Some ideas for publishing: (1) publicly on the internet, as a thoughtful website of examples so that others can make their own, maybe including a tool (a custom Chrome extension that presents your map every time you open a new tab), or (2) through a printed book or zine, as a sort of yearbook but also useful for sharing within the Princeton Community (3) something else?!

For this project, bring your thoughtful focus to your map and then help out with the collective publication in any way you can.
